So far these cameras have produced the most interesting content over the nighttime hours with many animal visitors on the campus. We have had opossums, skunks, a couple cats, and a fox! We do love our location near the park and our neighborly wildlife.

Not so neighborly are the mosquitos! We realized Monday that our barrels of Mosquito Nix were empty. They were refilled on Wednesday. This system sprays on a timer system daily and we can also use a remote when we notice an increase in activity. We also had our other mosquito control company Moxie come Tuesday evening—they use a back pack spray and bait program that lasts for about a month. The increase in the bothersome pests on Monday and Tuesday at least let us know that this combination of mosquito battle does make a difference! If you ever find you need their service, please share us as a referral and the school will get a credit on our account. Thanks!
